In all, the Foundation funded 72 grants totaling over \$155,387.57 during the year.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL STUDENTS ACCESSED:

- "Brain Bins" at General Nash to begin their day with creative thinking, interactive play, problem solving, and collaboration with peers.
- A school-wide visit at York Avenue with *author* and *illustrator Lee Harper*.
- A trip to Milky Way Farm, a historic dairy farm in Chester Springs, for English Language Learners at Hatfield.

MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS UTILIZED:

- A new video camera for studentled recording and editing, to help highlight music and theater for Pennbrook Television (PBTV).
- Tools to create a realistic experience designing and competing with stock cars. Students researched Coefficient of Friction, Aerodynamics, Newton's Laws of Motion, and incorporated their research to design, fabricate, test, and evaluate the stock cars.
- Materials for a Penndale Gardening Club project to research, plan, implement, and maintain a serene outdoor space for students, staff and visitors.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS EXPERIENCED:

- Science at Northbridge, through an integrated and immersive approach and visit to Adventure Aquarium.
- Electron orbital model sets for use in NPHS chemistry classes.
- Court extensions for the Unified Bocce team, composed of students with and without disabilities, to turn three courts into five.

EDUCATIONAL IMPROVEMENT TAX CREDIT PROGRAM

Pennsylvania's Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) provides companies with a 75% tax credit for donations to a non-profit scholarship or educational improvement organization. The tax credit increases to 90% if the company commits to making the same donations for two consecutive years. The NPSD Educational Foundation has multiple programs approved to receive EITC Funding, including *Design and Modeling for Ergonomics* (see page 7).

Design and Modeling for Ergonomics



Students in the technology education classes designed ergonomic adaptations for people with limited use of their hands or fingers. These devices are used for tasks in their daily lives, including writing and preparing meals. Designs were sketched then created using a 3D computer aided drawing (CAD) software. Student ideas, once developed electronically, were transferred to a 3D printer using a flexible filament to make their ideas come to life.

Reading Is Fundamental (RIF)

LITERACY

Established in 1966, Reading is Fundamental (RIF) has ignited a love for literacy by providing free access to books and literacy resources. For over 30 years, North Penn School District has partnered with RIF to provide books to its approximate 1,000 first graders across 13 elementary schools. When funding was cut by the sponsors of the RIF organization, the NPSD Educational Foundation stepped in to ensure funding continued to provide fun and meaningful literacy experiences to first graders throughout NPSD's 13 elementary schools.

In October each year, RIF kicks off in NPSD with a play put on by teachers, administrators and high school students demonstrating the importance and fun of reading. Throughout the school year there are events so students can experience the fun of reading, such as book distributions, meet the author or character events, read alouds, and assemblies and station rotations so students experience the Some of the other events NPSD has made available to first grades include:

- Kulp Elementary first graders adopted a penguin from the Philadelphia Zoo and learned all about penguins from reading about them.
- York Avenue Elementary first graders were inspired to be creative and act out their feelings with books written by Peter Reynolds.

Knapp Elementary first graders met Clifford the Big Red Dog and had fun reading about him in his books.

At the end of each RIF event, students choose their own books for their home library. The interactions young children enjoy at home with their caregivers, especially conversation and hearing stories read aloud, play a significant role in academic success and beyond. Children who have access to books gain the opportunity to learn about their world, acquire more sophisticated vocabulary, and understand how language works.

Fish and coral were purchased for breeding and propagation by marine science work-study students. **Currently, the NPHS marine science program is the only high school in the nation that maintains a professional and profitable coral and fish breeding lab.** The program supplies coral that has been propagated by students and sold for store credit to local businesses. This grant was used to build upon this success by purchasing new specimens of fish and coral that can be bred and propagated.

All 13 Elementary Schools + Extended School Care Program

Students enrolled in the NPSD's Extended School Care program were introduced to other cultures through reading books, playing games, participating in crafts and other activities from other cultures. Students discussed similarities and differences to their own lives while learning about how children around the world live. The project reinforced concepts taught during the school day in the areas of reading, social studies, art, teamwork and following rules. Students spent time listening, discussing concepts, learning new games and creating art projects based on the information and stories read from other cultures by providing hands-on enrichment activities.



Kindergarten through sixth grade students in the **Extended School Program** at each of North Penn's 13 elementary schools had the opportunity to read books and participate in crafts while learning about different cultures and experiences of children around the world.



Personalized Sewing Projects Using Modern Technology

HUMAN SERVICES/ CONSUMER SCIENCES/ STEM/ TECHNOLOGY

Over 1,000 Family Consumer Science (FCS) students each year use technical skills, spatial reasoning and fine motor skills in the FCS curriculum. Modern embroidery machines allow students to digitize a design and incorporate it into personalized sewing projects. Students created a sewing machine project based on their developmentally appropriate skills and were able to add personalization to their creations using the embroidery machine. Students added their name to a pillow case and added a connection of computerization in the fashion industry. Some students chose to donate sewing projects to community services or give as gifts to family.




№ OF GRANTS/AMOUNT OF FUNDING BY SCHOOL LEVEL (2022-2023)


